PRESIDENT'S REPORT

As this newsletter is being written our state, and much of our nation, is being gripped by the devastating bushfires. Our thoughts and best wishes go out to all in the Rugby community who have been affected by the fires and thanks to those who have given so much as volunteers to fight the fires or provide other support to those affected by, or fighting the fires.

On the 19th December, 2019 I participated in a national referees associations phone hook up organised by Shane Barr to update all Referees Associations across the nation regarding changes and updates that would be in place for the 2020 season. Shane has just been appointed to replace Jamie McGregor as the RA National Community Match Officials Manager.

A total of seven representatives logged/phoned in to this meeting from across Australia.

NSW Country referees associations were represented by two of those seven - myself and Ian Richardson (CWRRA)

Information Disseminated:

Shane Barr

Shane will take over the role of RA National Community Match Officials Manager from Jamie McGregor. Shane will be moving to Sydney in the near future.

Scott Young oversees the whole of refereeing from a Rugby Australia perspective.

Shane indicated that he would like to build on Association members being able to run and deliver Referee Kids Rugby and Level 1 courses (or part thereof).

There will be a workshop in mid January to align delivery of referee education programs. This will be the weekend of 17/18/19 January at the AIS in Canberra. A few from each state to attend.

There will be another meeting in 2020 similar to the one held in 2019. (NSW Country RRA President to attend). Date TBA.

Match officials at community level have received increases in funding.

At the elite level, 2019 has been the best for RA match officials since 2003. An increase in World Rugby appointments (a total of 52).

This has resulted in an increase in funding from World Rugby for elite level refereeing in Australia. We are now ranked fourth:

- 1. France
- 2. England
- 3. New Zealand
- 4. Australia

Australia has the least number of semi professional games to appoint to each weekend. We have less than 60 nationwide. England have in excess of 1000 and France has more than that again.

We have seen good growth in our position in the last 18 months.

Going really well in both men and womens 7s

Discussion about how rankings are done and what 'counts' towards' these rankings - currently is is based on senior mens (Wallabies) competitions. What about 7s/Womens/Under 20s/Under 18s appointments??

Occupation:

Social Worker

Family status:

Why you started in refereeing:

When I was in Year 10, my junior rugby team folded half way through the season. I did a referee course to allow me to continue to be involved in weekend rugby that season.

What you like most about refereeing:

I really enjoy being close to the action of the game. I also enjoy the mateship of the game, having a connection with all the players and supporters not just on the Coast, but around the country and the world.

Challenges in Refereeing:

I have found several challenges through my years of refereeing. One of them has been to not take personally the way players (and spectators) react to decisions. I remember in my first season on the Central Coast I had a bit of a difficult run with a particular captain in my second game of the year. Two weeks later I was appointed to referee the same team, and I spent the week worrying about how this captain was going to react when he saw me. Upon arrival at the ground this captain was really friendly to me, which is when I realised that players do not hold onto issues in regards to referees most of the time.

Highlights of refereeing to date:

- Refereeing my first grand final in Sydney (subbies colts),
- Being appointed to run touch for a schoolboy game which was the lead up game to the first ever Bledisloe Cup game at Stadium Australia (Homebush) in 2000. This allowed me the chance to watch the Haka at ground level before kickoff.
- Being selected to participate in a referee development program in Sydney.
- Being selected to referee NSW CHS 2nds vs NSW GPS 2nds, and running touch for firsts that year (which was refereed by test referee Stu Dickinson)- it was the last time CHS beat GPS for about 25 years.
- Being selected to referee Kings vs St Ignatius College first XV (the year Dean Mumm and many others were playing), which ended up being the championship deciding game that season.
- Refereeing my first (and only) Shute Shield second grade game (the last season I did in Sydney before I moved to the Coast.
- Being selected in the country representative panel for the first time.
- Refereeing my 200th first grade game on the central Coast
- Refereeing my 600th game as a referee (Sydney and Central Coast combined)

Where you'd like to go with your refereeing?:

I would like to referee a first grade grand final on the Central Coast, I would still like the opportunity to be selected in the NSW Country referee panel for the senior country championships one year, and I would like to try and referee more games than Tony Furey on the Central Coast......

Most unique experience as a referee:

I was given the opportunity to referee a combined Sydney University team (primarily 2nd and 3rd grade players) against a touring Japanese University team. Not one player on the Japanese team could speak, or understand, English, which made on-field communication very difficult- especially when I had to put a Japanese player on a warning for a possible yellow/red card.

Favourite Food: Roast lamb.



A try is scored when an attacking player:

(e) who is in touch or touch-in-goal, grounds the ball in the opponents' in-goal provided the player is not holding the ball.

RECRUITMENT

The CCRURA is always on the lookout for new members and now is an ideal time for prospective referees to express interested in gaining their referee qualification for 2020. There are a number of pathways for doing this:

Refereeing Under 8 to 12

Course – Refereeing Kids Rugby 8-12 (RKR)

Post Course Accreditation – Optional Exam

You must be 13 years old to referee these age groups. Anyone who completes the RKR course can be a Referee or Assistant Referee (AR) up to Under 12's.

These referees can also be appointed to matches by their club through the Club To Appoint (CTA) mechanism.

Smart Rugby will need to be completed separately to this course.


Refereeing Under 13 to Senior

Course – Foundation

Post Course Accreditation – Exam & On-Field Competency Assessment

You must be 15 years old to referee Under 13 matches or older and for junior referees who are 15/16/17 years of age you can only referee to an age group 2 years younger than your own age. Adults that do this course can referee at any level.

This course covers the requirements of Smart Rugby.

The Foundation/Level 1 Referee course will be held on the Central Coast on 16 March, 2020.
